Big Blues Put Green in Anglers' Pockets

Blue marlin were taken in recordsetting numbers and sizes during the sixth annual Mazatlan Billfish Classic, figuring heavily in the scoring. The first-place team, in fact, *Chupacabras*, finished in the lead by landing three blues during three days of competition. A 225-pound minimum qualifying weight was in effect for any billfish brought to the scales, and a penalty was imposed for any fish taken under that mark.

release format for big-money tournaments can successfully be carried-out and not embroiled in controversy," says Harvey Hunnicutt, president of International Gamefish Tournament, which oversees the annual offshore angling event.

A total of 26 elite big-game fishing teams turned out for the Mazatlan Classic put on by International Gamefish Tournaments and when the final tally was made, 196 billfish had been caught, of which 185 were released to fight another day, and 11 were blue marlin brought to the Marina El Cid scales.

The tournament is fast becoming a showcase for West Coast regional catch-and-release billfishing because of the event's innovative use of "sequence-



stamping" photos taken following releases, plus placing a cadre of trained observers one each to a boat among all competing craft. In addition, all liberated fish must be photographed in order to be eligible as a qualifying release.

Steve Campbell of Riverside, a blue-water, blue-diamond aficionado extraordinare, took a day off from his fishing-observer duties to catch and invite this large dorado to dinner.

Prior to the tournament, cadets at the Mexican Maritime Academy in Mazatlan, Mexico, were briefed on information and rules which would be important to them while serving as unbiased observers on all tournament boats.



So successful was the sixth annual Mazatlan Billfish Classic held out of Mazatlan, Mexico that a record \$200,000 in prize monies was awarded, with over 84% of the \$200,000 awarded to teams whose scoring was based on billfish released during the competition.

A 225-pound minimum weight was imposed for all fish brought to the scales, hence, prompting the release of literally every sailfish brought to leader. The majority of blue marlin found in Mazatlan waters at the time easily qualified as over the 225-pound

cutoff. Each released billfish earned 100 points, while each qualifying blue marlin earned points on a basic-points-plus-extra-poundage formula.

First place in the Mazatlan Billfish Classic was taken by the team fishing aboard *Chupacabras*, which amassed 2548 points by concentrating their efforts on blue marlin fishing and turning in a tourney-record, three-blue-marlin catch. The blues weighed 271, 277.5 and 392.5 pounds.

Chupacabras team members pocketed a total of \$103,100 in winnings,
